

Rochester's Police Department has now taken its place with the various law enforcement agencies in the area which have increased the efficiency of their services by using two-way radio systems.

Installation of the radio equipment recently paid dividends from the start and every succeeding day brings additional proof that the modern Police Department cannot operate efficiently without radio.

Rochester's n ew radio system provides two-way co munication between patrol car and headquarters and is also set to receive police radio broadcasts from surrounding communities and the sheriff's office in Pontiac.




